How everybody returned from the Guinness Storehouse remains a mystery to some of us but we didn't seem to lose anybody. Talking of losing people, we are also very grateful to Jan Bellenger for putting her local knowledge to excellent use in guiding those on the alternative social programme around the tourist spots of Dublin and further afield. Finally, my personal thanks are due to all those brave souls who "volunteered" for the Saturday evening "feis".

Monika, in her usual inimitable style, has organised a great venue in Basel. The old city contains a wealth of interesting buildings and museums. Basel is not only the heart of the pharmaceutical industry known by everybody - Basel has its own charm and very old and famous traditions, like the carnival "Basler Fasnacht", the famous Art museums and galleries and quite a large number of important fairs

and exhibitions.

The scientific programme under the aegis of David Spreng and John Walmsley should have something of appeal to all Diplomates. The format of the meeting will remain similar to that first introduced by Olivier Lepage in Lyon.

While speaking of meetings, it might be useful to mention the role of the local organizers. Those who wish to propose a venue are invited come forward with a proposal:

- that contains a choice of 2 venues (hotel and/or congress centre) and a price for each of these. The target cost for hotels is 100-150 Euros per night.
- that has 3 likely social functions with prices: the welcome reception on Thursday, a function for the 2nd evening (Friday), and the banquet on Saturday.
- Additionally, they should nominate a representative to assist the programme committee and identify a number of possible local helpers. As a guideline, 2-4 students, interns, or residents are required for the small animal and large animal sections respectively.
- Last but definitely not least, it is important to utilise personal links with local sponsors.

I hope this both clarifies and encourages Diplomates to offer future venues.

Finally, I would urge all Residents and Supervisors to read the new training brochure which is posted on the website. There have been a number of substantial changes which

might be summarized as follows:

1. For all Residents starting in 2007, there are changes in case numbers, submission deadlines, the appeal procedure, as well as changes in the timetable of the examination and in its format. There is a need to realign programmes and no extended deadlines will be permitted for publication acceptance.
2. For all other current Residents the information in the old training brochure continues to apply but with a new timetable and a change

in the format of the examination and submission of annual reports and credentials to which always the newest format applies

These changes reflect the continuing growth and success of the College and I want to thank all those who have worked so hard in formulating them.

Basel are running full speed. John Walmsley and David Spreng will provide further details on the present status of the programme in this Newsletter.

For one particular part of the programme I provide you some information: The AO Foundation will sponsor as part of its 50-year Anniversary a half-day seminar for small and large animal delegates. The programme is set such that a human- a small animal- and a large animal specialist will summarize the recent advances and new developments achieved in their fields in the trauma and craniomaxillofacial specialties. Additionally a human and a small animal specialist each will also summarize the advances in spinal surgery. We hope that this half-day meeting adds to the attractiveness of the 17th Annual Meeting in Basel. Please make already now plans to attend, you won't be sorry to visit Switzerland after the Euro 08 – there still will be some action.

Another topic is the continuously rising costs of everything. In the future ECVS asks a moderate placement fee for advertisement on our home page or in the newsletter. The payment form can be downloaded from the web site. This year we have also implemented the payment for the annual reports evaluation and so far the results are positive. We hope that these are appropriate ways to cover some of the increasing costs for the management of the residency programmes, the various meetings and the examination.

At the latest in 3 years I will retire and as of that moment we need a definite solution on how to continue the ECVS office. We encourage all of you to seek solutions. The Board is aware of this upcoming change in avenues and one and a half years ago the Annual Business Meeting adopted a plan set up by Stephen May and Michael Schramme to increase the per member portion of the annual membership fee to facilitate the creation of an independent office for ECVS. Just as information for those of you that do not know, presently the salary of Monika Gutscher and the ECVS office is footed by the AO Foundation, as part of an agreement going back to 1992, when the AOVET Centre moved to the University of Zurich.

Exam committee report



Dear Colleagues,

The small animal (SA) committee members (Davina Anderson as SA chairman, Daniel Damur, Bernard Bouvy, with Prue Neath and Annick Hamaide as observers) and the large animal (LA) committee (Roger Smith as chairman, Ann Martens, Karl Nuss and Jane Boswell as observer) are organising the preparation meetings for the examination in 2008. Paolo Buracco and Miguel Valdes will stay on one more year as advisors, reviewing the examination material and ensuring that we are consistent from one year to the next regarding content and standards.

2008 heralds a number of changes to the examination and it is important that supervisors make their candidates aware of what to expect.

This will be the final year that the examination will be held at the same time as the Annual meeting and as of 2009, the examination will be held annually in February. However 2008 will be a first on two counts for the examination; it will be held in Zurich, and the venue will remain unchanged from now on. This will facilitate the organisation of the meeting and make it more efficient for both examiners and the ECVS office.

The other first is that we will be using the written case based examination instead of the oral exam. This exam will be structured in a similar way to the previous oral examination and the questions will follow the progress of a case,

assessing the candidate's ability to interpret clinical data and make decisions for treatment. This is modelled on the ACVS system of examining case based material and we will have the outgoing 2007 ACVS examiners assisting us with the preparation and implementation of this part of the exam.

The 2008 examination will start on Sunday July 6th with the case based exam in the morning and the practical in the afternoon. The written (multiple choice) will be on the Monday and Tuesday and the exam should be fully marked in time for the ECVS office to pack up and move to Basel for the annual congress!

We would like to be able to talk the candidates through the case based exam, so we urge you to encourage your residents to arrive in Zurich the night before the exam in time to attend a meeting with the examiners where we will explain how the exam will work. We will explain the session again the following morning prior to the exam.

Finally, all of you should have received the request for questions. We are having to replace nearly all of the questions this year. Please, please submit questions and help us with this enormous task. Remember that it is a good way to earn points for re-certification.

We wish all the candidates and supervisors well in their preparation for the exam in 2008 and please do not hesitate to contact us if you have any queries regarding the exam.

Report from the Credentials Committee



The Credentials Committee had their autumn meeting in Zurich on November 1st and 2nd 2007. The overall quality of the materials submitted to the committee this year was very good. Again, the Credentials Committee

wishes to thank all residents and supervisors for their attention to detail when preparing credentials submissions and annual reports. Again, we are indebted to Monika and Miriam for keeping the material on the web page up to date and for helping the Credentials Committee meeting run smoothly. Overall, the annual reports and new applications from 138 trainees and the credentials of 47 candidates were evaluated.

Credentials

The credentials of 47 residents were evaluated, 16 were large animal and 31 were small animal. Twenty nine were provisionally accepted pending final approval by the Board of Regents. Eight candidates were granted an extended deadline awaiting a letter of full acceptance of a publication. One candidate had an extended deadline granted to provide the Credentials Committee with the full number of reference letters. Four candidates were declined because they had not completed the publication requirements.

Three Large animal candidates whose credentials were rejected in 2006 did not resubmit credentials for 2007.

Yearly reports and new programmes:

The yearly reports and new programmes of 138 residents were evaluated. Of these, 88 were small animal and 50 were large animal. There were 28 applications to start new small animal programmes 26 of which were accepted. The two that were turned down were for Alternate VSTPs for which the candidate did not fulfil the criteria for acceptance described in the training

brochure. Sixty small animal annual reports were accepted with minimal or no comment from the Credentials Committee. There were 9 applications to start new large animal programmes; all were accepted entirely or pending clarification of minor aspects of the application. Forty large animal annual reports were accepted with minimal or no comment from the Credentials Committee. One annual report was not accepted.

Credentials Committee Chairman's comments:

Electronic submissions:

The web-based computer programme that we use to manipulate the year's electronic submissions continues to work well. Unfortunately, however, several of the reports and credentials submissions were not correctly formatted as PDF files. This created a huge amount of work for the ECVS office. The Credentials Committee has adopted a "relaxed" attitude regarding electronic submission of credentials and yearly reports, whilst we have been developing the credentials website. But in future, if submissions are not in the correct format, they will be considered incomplete and the Credentials Committee will not evaluate them. We will put a link on the ECVS website to PDF maker software to facilitate this process. Please refer to the Training Brochure for how to report to the Credentials Committee.

Publications:

Failure to meet publication requirements remains the most common reason for a candidate to fail to get his or her credentials accepted. The Credentials Committee would like to remind supervisors and trainees that scientific papers published in "A" listed journals will be accepted automatically whereas papers published in "B" listed journals will be reviewed by the Credentials Committee prior to acceptance. If the candidate chooses to publish in any other journal, the Credentials Committee will review it and it may fall upon

the candidate to furnish proof that the journal is double peer reviewed. In the new academic year, it will not be possible to grant extended deadlines. Credentials for the 2009 exam (and yearly reports for that year) must be submitted by July 31st 2008. If credentials do not contain either: proof of full acceptance of publications (and a copy of the manuscripts in its accepted form), or a copy of the published papers, they will be incomplete and the candidate will have to re-submit the following year.

Case load and case reporting:

It is common for residents to report minor procedures on their surgery log. Often this is a tactic to increase total numbers in order to achieve the minimum recommended numbers. The Credentials Committee understands that one of the most crucial aspects of being a good surgeon is knowing when surgical therapy is appropriate. The Credentials Committee also understands the value of, for example, small animal lameness examinations, biopsy procedures and thoracocentesis but these cannot be included as a "surgical procedure" in the surgical log. Again, in 2007, we were asked to consider: Cadaver procedures, PDA coiling, PS ballooning, serial wound debridements (as a separate operation each), dental extraction, cast

application, thoracocentesis, thoracostomy tube placement, seroma drainage. Please do not include these in your surgery logs in future submissions. We would also request a concise and useful description of the procedure performed in the log "excision" of mass is not sufficiently specific, for example. Finally, if an animal has one procedure that leads to another for example an arthroscopy that has to be converted to an arthrotomy, it should only appear once in the log (under joint surgery) rather than twice.

Statute of limitations:

A reminder that there is a time limit for Standard VSRP and Alternate VSTP of six years and eight years respectively for a candidate who enters such a programme to submit credentials. If the Credentials Committee does not receive credentials within this time limit the resident will be removed from the Credentials Committee database, unless the resident can demonstrate extenuating circumstances.

ACVS publications committee report



The ACVS publication committee (PC) is appointed by the Board of Regents of the ACVS and the ECVS has one representative in this committee. The functions of the ACVS publication committee include judging the ACVS Publication

Awards and to provide oversight for the ACVS and ECV official publication, *Veterinary Surgery*. Current members are Ed Murphey (Chair) Clare Gregory (Assistant Chair), Julius Liptak, Peter Muir, John Pascoe (Editor *Veterinary Surgery*), Micky Trent (ex officio),

and Steven Budsberg (ex officio Board Liaison). Jolle Kirpensteijn is the ECVS representative. The following activities were initiated during the last year; The BOR of the ACVS had requested to evaluate if free online subscription to *Vet Surg* should be available for students participating at surgical clubs in their respective schools. A valid point was made that most students had free access through the university library systems. Nevertheless the PC favoured providing free access to all students (possibly including those in Europe and Australia). Ultimately this was not approved by the BOR. Richard Walshaw's Associate Editor's vacancy has been filled by Giselle Hosgood. The com-

mittee reviewed a total of 4 complete applications for the position.

The committee was unanimously in favor of affiliations with other organizations whose membership consisted of veterinarians interested in veterinary surgery. Broadly, these could be categorized into 2 groups: 1) Foreign 'equivalents' to the ACVS or ECVS; and 2) Surgical Subspecialty societies, such as Veterinary Society of Surgical Oncology or the Society of Veterinary Endovascular Surgery. Benefits for Veterinary Surgery could potentially include: 1) Increased manuscript submission from affiliate society members; 2) Increased numbers of subscribers; and 3) Decreased competition for manuscripts with newly formed journals specific to each society. Benefits to affiliated organizations could include: 1) Reduced cost of subscription to Veterinary Surgery; 2) Increased visibility of the organization; and 3) a vehicle in which to publish manuscripts and meeting abstracts. Criteria for selecting affiliates, representation of those affiliates on the editorial review board, cost and/or revenue sharing, and how these affiliations would be promoted on the cover of, or within, Veterinary Surgery will be presented to the BOR.

The committee was unanimously in favor of providing free access to past issues of Veterinary Surgery 1 year after publication. Benefits of providing free access to Veterinary Surgery articles 1 year after publication date include: 1) Broader dissemination of knowledge of topics related to veterinary surgery throughout the world; and 2) Increased visibility of papers published within Veterinary Surgery - this could potentially benefit the impact factor of the journal if it resulted in higher numbers of papers referencing papers published in Veterinary Surgery. Blackwell is not supporting this idea because of the recent investment and anticipated decrease in revenue and the board supports Blackwell in this. Certain specific articles and reviews may be available for open access.

The committee reviewed 42 papers published in Veterinary Surgery, which were submitted by ACVS and ECVS residents as primary authors and were eligible for an ACVS resident publica-

tion award. The committee ranked 26 papers submitted in the research and 16 in the clinical category. The winners were announced during the ACVS Surgical Symposium in Chicago and include Dr Faria's Recombinant Human BMP-2 in Absorbable Collagen Sponge Enhances Bone Healing of Tibial Osteotomies in Dogs Manuscript for the research category and Dr. Klein's Preoperative Immunosuppressive Therapy and Surgery as Treatment for Anal Furunculosis for the clinical category. Manuscript submission in 2007 to Vet Surg is 170 to date, with an acceptance rate of approximately 65%. Of the manuscript accepted (n=111), 72 were from the US, 11 from the UK, 3 from Canada, 6 from Germany, 4 from Holland, 3 from India, and 2 from Austria, France and Switzerland each. Turn around time for publication in Vet Surg is now less than a year from submission to publication.

In the near future, each issue will include a invited review article and special focus issues are planned once yearly. A special Associate Editor will be appointed to streamline and organize the invited reviews and special focus issues. Additionally, all issues of Vet Surg will be available digitally.

Blackwell has initiated a positive marketing strategy and that seems to be paying off. The overall circulation and also the consortia site access has increased significantly in 2007. The impact factor of Vet Surg has been relatively stable, however a slight decrease was seen in 2006 (1.121) compared to 2005 (1.211). This leads to a ranking of 36/128.

Because Vet Surg is our official journal, it is obviously important for the ECVS to support Vet Surg. ECVS Diplomates and surgical residents alike should be stimulated to send in their manuscripts for review. The digital submission possibility and the relative quick turn around time facilitate publication of the manuscripts.
